Strategic Planning Introduction and Process Overview

The Library Board of Directors and its ad hoc Strategic Planning Committee began conversations around the 2019 plan early in 2018 with the aim of developing community-driven initiatives and goals to direct the library's future. The Library Director spent 2018 participating as an Allegheny County Library Fellow—a committee whose charge involved examining emerging library trends and drafting ideas which foster increased library inclusivity.

The Strategic Planning Committee engaged in the following initiatives over the course of the year:

- Developed a Community Day questionnaire based upon the Harwood Institute's "Turning Outward" model—examining the needs and desires of the community to drive change https://theharwoodinstitute.org/approach/.
- Launched a detailed community survey, both in print and online, that was distributed to every household in Whitehall. This survey was also widely shared among a large network of community partner organizations.
- Hosted an "Around the Table" community conversation with a targeted focus group of library users and community stakeholders. https://aroundthetablesouth.org/about/.
- Conducted a detailed S.W.O.T. analysis with library staff members. https://bloomerang.co/blog/how-nonprofits-can-use-a-swot-analysis.

In addition, the Allegheny County Library Association conducted a Community Responsiveness profile of Whitehall and the Whitehall Public Library in 2016.

Strategic Plan Initiatives and Goals

Assembling and analyzing the data and community feedback, the committee noted common themes which have been identified so as to inform strategic priorities. Associated goals were developed around each initiative. Goals will be periodically benchmarked during the course of the plan's timeline.

Initiative 1: The Whitehall Public Library is a proactive intentionally welcoming place that supports diversity and inclusion.

- The library will provide resources among its collection and offer programs that reflect community diversity and support inclusion.
- The library will work to convene a volunteer group of community members that will meet to plan and support welcoming events and programs.
- The library will work toward increasing diversity among staff and board.
- The library staff will have an enhanced understanding of community diversity through professional development opportunities focusing upon cultural competency, local diversity, compassion, and empathy. Staff will provide consistent outstanding customer service.
- The library will provide public awareness regarding local diversity and strive to
 educate both newcomers and long-term residents. The library will work to
 promote the Borough of Whitehall as a welcoming community and an attractive
 place to reside, and will work to educate the community about local civics and
 government.

Initiative 2: The library serves as the de facto community center where people gather for civic engagement, social interaction, and information gathering. This engagement may occur both within the library as well as within the capacity of library outreach and the digital environment.

- The library will continue to utilize its existing space in effective ways to promote 21st century skills around collaboration and creation. Considerations will be made towards customer-focused use of space, collection resources, and signage.
- The library will continue to offer programs and services for all ages; however, additional focus will be placed upon programs and services that will attract teens and young families.
- The library will strive to better meet the needs of the community's underserved populations through targeted programs, outreach service, and examining and possibly mitigating identified barriers to library use.

Initiative 3: The library actively explores and evaluates new and emerging technologies and devices.

- The library will keep current with emerging information delivery systems and devices along with any associated applications. It will strive to meet public demand for library digital content in a variety of formats and platforms along with associated customer service support.
- The library will provide a variety of educational opportunities for library users and library staff to increase knowledge and awareness with regard to current technologies, devices, and applications.
- The Children's Library will focus strongly on STEM/STEAM activities and programs.

Initiative 4: The library celebrates and reinforces the community's love for books through engagement around reading and literacy-based initiatives.

- The library will offer a variety of program opportunities focused on books, authors, and reading for all ages.
- The library will maintain a strong and well-balanced collection in a variety of reading formats.
- The library will proactively champion the benefits of reading and literacy for all ages.


Initiative 5: The Whitehall Public Library is committed to maintaining a positive relationship with donors, funders, patrons, and the public at large.

Q1 Do you have a library card?



Q2 What is your age?








Q6 Have you used the library for technology help?

Q7 How do you find out about library-related information? Check all that apply.








Q9 What types of library programs interest you most? Check all that apply.






Q10 What days/times would you most like to attend library programs? Check all that apply.

Introduction

Libraries and Community Engagement

This project aspires to enable ACLA's libraries in ten South Hills communities to broaden their strategies for community engagement. The collection of literature on Community Engaged Libraries reveals several common elements among these libraries. The Harwood Institute states that libraries must "talk with community members to find out what they want for their community, [and] this Public Knowledge will empower the library to truly reflect and empower the community."

Libraries must focus their efforts on discovering community wants and needs through participatory practices and recognize that providing small-scale changes can provide tangible benefits that are just as significant as large-scale projects.

Tips from the Harwood Institute & the ALA:

Libraries Transforming Communities

The power of community engaged libraries was demonstrated by a 2014 project conducted by the American Library Association and the Harwood Institute called *Libraries Transforming Communities*. LTC

sought to develop strategies, tools, and guidance to help libraries initiate or deepen their community engagement practices.

They found that successful community engagement happens when libraries:

- Engage community members in decisionmaking
- Align programming to community need
- Develop partnerships and collaborations
- Facilitate community conversations & invite stakeholders
- Enable community members to take leadership roles in program development and facilitation
- Embed mechanisms for continual listening and engagement
- Include traditionally socially excluded populations



Key Action Steps for Local Libraries from the Aspen Institute

- I. Define scope of programs and offerings, recognizing tradeoffs
- 2. Collaborate with local, state and federal agencies around shared objectives & partner with schools to drive learning and educational opportunities
- 3. Partner with local businesses, economic development agencies, chamber of commerce, & community colleges to provide access to curricula and job training programs
- 4. Engage the community in planning and decision-making and include on policy boards.
- 5. Connect to resources from other agencies or libraries rather than reinventing the wheel
- 6. Deploy existing resources in new ways
- 7. Measure library outcomes and impacts to better demonstrate the value to the community
- 8. Change long-held rules and operating procedures impeding the development of the library's spaces and platform
- 9. Take proactive and sustained steps to brand the library as a platform for community learning and development

Bringing it Home: Whitehall Borough

Whitehall is a community of roughly 14,000 residents in the South Hills of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, encompassing 3.2 square miles. The borough is six miles from downtown Pittsburgh via Rt. 51, along which four bus lines are operated by Port Authority Transit on weekdays.


Whitehall is governed by a mayor and seven Council Members who are elected at large, has a tenemployee Public Works Department and a 20-member police force. Public School students in Whitehall attend the Baldwin-Whitehall School District.

Many amenities exist in the Whitehall community, including the Whitehall Public Library, a public swimming pool, the South Hills Country Club, tennis courts, baseball fields, playgrounds, and a community garden. There are also several athletic associations that are shared with the neighboring Baldwin Borough, such as the Baldwin-Whitehall Soccer Association, Baldwin Hockey Club, Greater Baldwin-Whitehall Athletic Association Baseball and Softball, Baldwin-Whitehall Youth Football and Cheerleading.

Population Data & Demographics

Since 2000, the borough has experienced only a slight 4% population decline. This decline, however, is most notable among the native white population and has been offset by recent growth among minority populations, including a significant number of Bhutanese refugees.

Population data is otherwise fairly stable: the median age in the borough has steadily remained around 44 years since 2000 and women continue to slightly outnumber men. The percent of residents over age 65%, however, has trended slightly downward by about 1% every five years according to census data.



Economic Indicators

Over recent years,

Whitehall has experienced economic growth. The median household income rose to \$56,196 in 2014, up from \$45,111 in 2000. Residential prices are also increasing. Roughly 94% of adult males and 95% of adult females are employed and active in the labor force. Additionally, a higher percentage of residents are graduating high school, attaining Bachelor's Degrees, and Master's Degrees than they were five years ago.

Conversely, while incomes increase and the borough enjoys an active labor force, unemployment and poverty have simultaneously risen as well, each by about 2%.

Social Services

In 2014, 903 Whitehall residents accessed social services through the Allegheny County Department of Human Services and its provider network. As demonstrated by an analysis of the population served by DHS and its providers, residents of Whitehall are, generally, accessing social services at lower rates than the regional average. The only services for which it is untrue are Intellectual Disability services. The highest needs within Whitehall however, are for Aging services and Mental Health services and support.

Analysis of Reported Need: Key Themes

Community

While community feedback reflected a broad variety of individual strengths, needs, and interests, some recurring themes did appear in the data.

Community Spirit	Residents overwhelmingly expressed positive feelings about the Whitehall Community, citing the "small-town, community atmosphere," convenient location, and many amenities.
Engaging Whitehall's Growing Diversity	New residents are moving to Whitehall and local service providers, organizations, and community members recognize the need to adapt services to the needs of these populations as well build bridges between long-term residents and these new, diverse populations.
Local Arts Programs	While downtown isn't too far away, local residents expressed a desire to see more local opporunities to engage in creative art and music programs, as well as bring more cultural events into the community.
Opportunities for Education & Professional Development	Whitehall residents are eager to learn and expressed interest in learning everything from new technologies, like Excel classes for students and social media for seniors, to foriegn languages. Opportunities for professional development, financial literacy, and career services were also expressed as needs.
Reflecting Minority Cultures	As Whitehall's diversity continues to grow, inclusivity will be key. African American and Bhutanese residents both reflected that they would like to see an increase in culturally (and linguistically) relevant material in the library and surrounding community.
Health and Wellness	Health was expressed as a priority across all ages. Mental health and substance abuse are primary concerns in the community. Interests in increasing health literacy and promoting fitness were expressed, as well as supports for specific populations, such as seniors and expectant mothers.
Supports for Families	Families showed interests in supports such as parenting classes and maternal health resources, as well as increased activities for youth in the community and targeted programs for families who have members with Special Needs, including physical and developmental disabilities.
Transportation as a Key Barrier	Generally, getting around in Whitehall requires access to a vehicle. This is particularly limiting for elderly populations and youth.
Desire for a	Residents of all ages and ethnicities noted that there were few places to gather

together. Teens, seniors, immigrants, and families all expressed the desire for a

As refugees, they share views that are unique to their culture and experiences and are therefore separated in the results to highlight their particular community perceptions and needs.

Bhutanese Perspectives

Challenges Reported by the Bhutanese Community Association of Pittsburgh

- Navigating US system: Numerous new and difficult to understand laws and systems
- Lack of local Hindu temple or community center to be able to practice cultural traditions: births, funerals, marriages. (Nearest temple→Monroeville)
- Growing divide between generations, in conflict with strong familial values
 - Expanding language gap between seniors and youth
 - Youth are quicker to adapt to American culture
- Seniors are isolated by language, culture, and limited mobility—though they will walk
- Need to involve community with activities
- Traditional agrarian culture has been lost in urban atmosphere
- Alcoholism and Substance Abuse are growing concerns, especially among youth

Activities & Interests

- Majority of time taken up by work and attending classes for ESL and Citizenship Preparation
- Many attend "extra-curricular" ESL/Civics classes at BCAP in addition to GPLC, AIU
- Gardening is popular given community's rural roots
- Traditional crafts, music and dancing
- Media consumption: Watching movies and television
- Family obligations: Spending time with children, walks with spouses, visiting relatives

Youth Perceptions

 - racism, fear about having to leave country if Trump is elected, tensions and bullying in school, particularly with African American students,
 - o Improved quality of housing
 - No local Temple to practice religion
 - Transportation is challenging
 - Without a community center serving as a positive space for teens to hang out in some kids go down bad paths
 - Limited Engagement: The Nepali population tends to stick together.
 They can speak more fluently with each other and find it difficult to connect with others who lack similar life experiences.
 - o Leland Point communities lack amenities and access to services
 - o Enjoy playing soccer, but lack soccer field access
